Letter from Jane Baker

We have heard from Jane Baker one of our members who used to work at Kindrogan. Jane was sponsored by an American group to train for three years at the Bible Training Institute in Glasgow. Suddenly after two years the sponsorship was withdrawn and Jane had to take up office work to earn enough to continue her course. The following is an excerpt from her letter:

"From the moment I had the first phone call intimating that all was not well I felt very much at peace and able to accept whatever the outcome was as God's will".

"A year of clerical work may seem a waste, but God never wastes anything. One of the most valuable things so far has been the opportunity to be a Christian in an ordinary secular environment and since I had to explain my situation to those I was working with that gave the opportunity for conversation about what I believe. Talking about my faith is not something I find easy, but one girl was open to talking and as she is the sort of girl who asks very direct questions and wants straight answers that helped. Though she has left now we are still in

Jane says she has managed to get a flat with a very low rent which includes a pint of milk a day! - and continues ...

"writing this gives me the opportunity to thank all those who gave so generously for my support over the summer including the fee for the Tell a Stranger in Chester. I wondered whether I would ever be able to walk up to a stranger and talk about Christ, but I discovered that half the team felt as I did but there is a saying 'where God calls, He equips', and we found this to be true. One of the team led a girl to Christ near the beginning of the fortnight and we met many who were 'thinking about' going to church and are now in touch with Christians in their own country or are receiving Bible Study courses. We gave out John's Gospels and other Scriptures in many languages. A girl from Qatar accepted a Gospel in Arabic and later in London a lad from Qatar made a profession Qatar is a Moslem country which according to the prayer handbook Operation World has no known believers. So T.A.S. in Britain was involved there in a frontier of mission - which means that everyone who gave financially and supported me in prayer was involved too! Please keep praying - that I'll be able to stand firm at work; for the Sunday School class I help with now; that I will be willing to pack up after the course is finished and to go wherever God wants me to go; and most of all that I'll be able to continue to trust in Him to show me the way forward step by step.

I go to Bible Study and prayer group and we all pray together as well as individually for Strathardle and Glenshee. It's good to get news of the glens.

Some Christmas Recipes

A Christmas Cake (Mr. Stephen)

1 lb. Margarine and 1 lb. Butter

1 lb. Brown sugar and 1 lb. Caster

l oz. Treacle (about 1 teasp)

Cream together and add 4 eggs, one at a time, creaming it between each one. Mix in:

2 oz. ground almonds, 7 oz. plain flour and 2 ozs. selfraising, ½ lb. sultanas ½ lb. Ralsins, ½ lb. currants, 2 oz. peel and 2 oz. cherries.

Line the tin as usual and bake at 280F or 150C for nearly 3 hours.

Nutty Chicken with French Mustard

4 X 100g/4oz Chicken breast fillets, boned and skinned

4 Teasp. French Mustard

15g/3 oz. Hazelnuts, chopped

15g/2 oz. Fresh breadcrumbs

1 Teasp. Mixed herbs

Method: Place the chicken on a board and spread each side with the mustard. Mix the remaining ingredients on a plate. Coat each piece of chicken with the mixture, covering well. Chill for 15 minutes then shallow fry for 6-8 minutes each side.

Recipe for a Happy Home (from a friend in Thailand)

To 3 cups of love and 2 cups of understanding, add 4 teaspoons of courtesy and 2 teaspoons each of thoughtfulness and helpfulness. Sift together thoroughly, then stir in an equal amount of work and play. Add 3 teaspoons of responsibility. Season to taste with study and culture. Then fold in a generous amount of worship. Place in a pan well greased with security and lined with respect for personality. Sprinkle lightly with a sense of humour. Allow to set in an atmosphere of democratic planning and mutual sharing. Bake in a moderate oven. When well done, remove and top with a thick coating of real common sense. Serve in a platter of friendliness garnished with smiles.
