My dear people


MORNING HYMN (16th Century)

Just at the start of the Compass Project I read the following in a book "Living by faith ... you may learn the principles in albook, or sitting in church, but the laboratory in which this will be made real in your experience will be in your valley of Elah (where David took on and slew Goliath), with a giant against which you have no reasonable hope of victory were you to meet him on your own, but with the promise of God behind you and the life of God within you, step out and enjoy a display of the glory and goodness of God!"

These words seemed very appropriate at that time for was not a Project target of £90,000 in 4 months a considerable giant, let alone a total Project of over £250,000. On our own we "had no reasonable hope of victory" but claiming God's promise to provide all our needs from His riches in glory through Christ Jesus (Phil 4 v 19) we stepped out in faith and we have seen and enjoyed "a display of the glory and goodhess of God".

The purchase of Glenshee Lodge and surrounding land went ahead on schedule on 31st July. With that cornerstone firmly in place we can now proceed to Phase 2, the building of a Sports Hall. Estimated costs are around £200,000 - aome £45,000 is already in hand (£15,000 arriving anonymously in a plain parcel full of £50 notes!) With God's gracious provision for Phase 1 behind us we press on with Phase 2. A target date for starting the work has been set for mid-August 1989 - completing by the end of November 1989. Please continue to pray for us as we move ahead with planning applications etc and rejoice with us in what God has done already.

When completed the Sports Hall will be available by the local community. It will be big enough for a full size badminton court and can also be used for a variety of other things including carpet bowls, volleyball, netball, indoor football etc. The ancillary rooms will house table tennis, snooker etc.

- 4 Rainbow or brown trout, cleaned but with the heads left on.
- 2 level tablespoons plain flour, seasoned with salt and pepper
- 3 oz butter

2 og flaked almonds

the juice of half a lemon

Uash and thoroughly dry the trout. Toss them in the flour. Melt the oil and 1 oz of the butter in a pan and fry the fish two at a time for about 5 minutes on each side, turning them carefully. Drain and keep warm.

When all the trout are cooked, wipe pan clean then melt the rest of the butter and fry the almonds till brown. Remove from the heat and stir in the lemon juice, then spoon the mixture over the fish before serving.
